NOTES, TEXTS & TRANSLATIONS

"Life" | Music by Harry T. Burleigh | Words by John Boyle O'Reilly



Henry Thacker ("Harry") Burleigh (1866–1949) was an American composer, arranger, and professional singer known for his baritone voice. In 1892 he won a scholarship to study at the National Conservatory of Music in New York where he studied with Victor Herbert and Antonín Dvořák. He learned plantation songs and spirituals from his grandfather, a former slave. With Dvořák's encouragement, began to transcribe and arrange them. Though today Burleigh is best known for his arrangements of spirituals, his art songs and song cycles

were performed by numerous well-known classical singers in the early twentieth century. He sang professionally during his entire adult life, and during a tour of London with composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, he sang for King Edward VII and other English nobility. He served as a staff editor for the G. Ricordi publishing house in New York for 28 years and was a founding member of ASCAP.²



John Boyle O'Reilly (1844–1890) was an Irish poet, journalist and civil rights activist. He fought for Britain but was arrested and sentenced to twenty years penal service in Australia for treason. He escaped to the United States, where he continued to work for Irish freedom and became a popular lecturer. By 1875 he had gained notoriety as a published poet. He was a staunch advocate for the rights of African Americans and frequently gave talks on "civil rights and human freedom."

Life | Song text combines two short poems by John Boyle O'Reilly: "Loving is Dreaming" and "Life is a Confluence."

On the surface, this song appears simplistic, perhaps naïve. However, the openness and starkness of the harmonic progression alongside the text suggests a sophisticated awareness of the human condition, the presence of evil among us, and the infinite importance of love. Burleigh's combination of two poems (each stanza is a separate poem) becomes a summation of life and its purpose: to move toward beauty and love.

Life is a certainty, death is a doubt; Men may be dead while they're walking about; Love is as needful to being as breath; Loving is dreaming, and waking is death. Hunger goes sleeplessly thirsting for food; Evil lies painfully yearning for good; Life is a confluence: nature must move, Like the heart of the poet, toward beauty and love.

ABOUT THE PERFORMERS



Mezzo-soprano **Cherry Duke** has performed over 50 principal roles with opera companies and orchestras throughout the US and abroad, including the world premiere, tour, and original cast album of the acclaimed 2012 opera, DOG DAYS. Duke toured with the American Spiritual Ensemble from 2011–14, and sang with them virtually in 2020. She was a soloist in A SPIRITUAL MESSIAH created by John Wesley Wright and performed in recital with Wright in A SPIRITUAL CHRISTMAS. Recently, Duke was a soloist with the El Paso Symphony Orchestra in

the world premiere the EL PASO REQUIEM and played Julia Child in BON APPÉTIT with El Paso Opera. As an Artistic Associate with El Paso Opera, Duke is a co-producer of the annual GIVING VOICE festival, designed to amplify Latinx voices in opera. In the summers of 2021 and 2022 she attended "Singing Down the Barriers," a week-long intensive course of study with top scholars and performers of vocal works by Black composers. Cherry Duke has served as director of opera and professor of voice at the University of Texas at El Paso since 2015.



Accomplished concert pianist and coach/accompanist **Esequiel Meza**, **Jr.** has coached multiple productions for El Paso Opera, served as Music Director for Stagedoor Manor Institute of the Performing Arts in New York, and as an accompanist for Arizona Opera. Other music directing credits include New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Lyric Opera Company, Music Theater of El Paso, Cimarron Circuit Opera Company, and Southern Arizona Light Opera Company. He has performed as guest soloist with the Juarez Bi-National Symphony Orchestra and the

symphonies of Corpus Christi, Bordeaux, and Shreveport. Meza has won several awards and has taught on the faculty of the University of Oklahoma where he was also Assistant Dean of Fine Arts and at the University of Bordeaux III in Talence, France. He holds degrees in piano performance from Sam Houston State University, the University of Arizona, and Indiana University. Since 2016, Dr. Meza has been the principal pianist and vocal coach for Opera UTEP.


